Theme: El Salvador

Reading 1: El Salvador in Central America, was named 'The Saviour' by the Spanish conquistadors. Though only a 1/12 the size of the UK it has a population of 6.5 million people, of whom 1 million live in the capital San Salvador (Holy Saviour). The countryside and coastline of this county, known as the 'Land of Volcanoes', are breathtaking. Its lively culture has Indigenous, Spanish and Indian influences. Salvadoreans are known for being hospitable and proud of their country. 3 million Salvadoreans work in the USA and send money back home.

El Salvador has a troubled history and has been one of the most violent countries in the world. Ongoing political and economic instability resulted in a civil war from 1979 – 1992.

Catholic Archbishop Óscar Romero was assassinated in 1980 whilst taking mass in a hospital chapel. The day before his murder, his appeal to the army to disobey orders was broadcast on the radio: "In the name of God, in the name of this suffering people whose cries rise to Heaven more loudly each day, I implore you, I beg you, I order you in the name of God: Stop the repression!"

The struggle for power continued after the peace settlement in 1992, with violent gangs controlling areas of the country. The current government have suspended some civil liberties to enable the arrests, mass trials and indefinite detention of suspected gang members. 70,000 are currently in detention, which is more than 1% of the population.

Corruption, injustice, prejudice and intolerance are endemic. Abortion is illegal under any circumstances and there is widespread discrimination and violence against women, LGBTIQ+ people, as well as violence amongst and towards young men.

El Salvador is mostly Christian. Evangelical churches are growing fast and will soon outnumber Catholics in followers. Evangelical churches are popular with gangs because of their message of forgiveness and that one sin is as bad as another. In this way, being gay, abortion and murder are considered the same.

Reading 2: The government's heavy-handed approach enjoys more than 90% support with the Salvadorean public, exhausted after years of gang intimidation and extortion. Document checks and searches are a common occurrence.

However, not everyone arrested was part of the gangs. Far from the capital's urban neighbourhoods, in the dusty village of La Noria, a young tractor driver, José Duval Mata, was arrested and imprisoned.

In April 2022, soon after the state of exception was imposed, soldiers entered his community and stopped him on his way home. They took his telephone and accused him of "unlawful association", a catch-all term under which tens of thousands have been detained for alleged gang affiliation.

José's mother, Marcela Alvarado, has not seen or heard from him since and is desperate with worry. "You hear so many things: that they're torturing them in there, that they hit them," she says between sobs. "When my son was imprisoned, I went to the jail and spent 18 days outside, with a crowd of people. And you'd hear their cries coming from inside: 'Help us, help! I can't take any more!' That caused me so much pain in my heart."

Ms Alvarado says her son's only legal proceeding, so far, was a mass hearing with 360 other inmates. They were all sentenced to an initial six months in prison - a sentence which has subsequently been extended.

Before the hearing, Ms Alvarado was advised to bring a stack of documents - from his clean criminal record and high school diploma to a reference from his employer - which attested to his innocence and lack of involvement in gang activity. She says that the court ignored them all.

Pues si vivimos, para Él vivimos, y si morimos, para Él muramos; sea que vivamos o que muramos, somos del Señor, somos del Señor. **Reading 3:** Fernanda, a 27 year old transgender woman, left El Salvador to seek relative safety in the USA, but the journey was not easy. With just \$200 in her pocket, she took a bus across El Salvador and used a makeshift raft to cross Mexico's southern border. For a time, she was one of the hundreds of thousands of people stranded at the dangerous U.S.-Mexico border. There, she sought safety in a shelter in Mexico, created and run by trans women in the same predicament.

Northern Central America is considered one of the most dangerous regions for women and LGBTIQ+ people. In El Salvador and across the region, trans women are especially vulnerable. The life expectancy for a trans woman in El Salvador is just 33 years, a staggering 41 years lower than the population average.

Threats and discrimination extended to Fernanda's family. Her parents, who had supported her, started receiving hate messages and were harassed. One night Fernanda and her sister were attacked, targeted because Fernanda was wearing women's clothes.

Fernanda was finally able to cross into the U.S., along with many of the women from the shelter. But many asylum seekers with similar stories continue to be turned away.

"My dream upon arriving in the United States is to find a decent job, to have an income to help my parents," Fernanda said. "I want to feel like a productive person for society, doing whatever I can: as a waitress, cleaning staff or cook. A decent job for me is where you can do something that is paid for and that is not denied to me because of how I look."

"I try not to think too much about my past but about what awaits me in the future and how today will surprise me."
