Opening responses: (From Micah 4:2–4)

Leader: Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord,

All: that God may teach us his ways and we may walk in God's paths.

Leader: Our God shall arbitrate for many peoples; between strong nations far away,

All: and they shall beat their swords into ploughshares, and their spears into pruning-hooks.

Leader: Nation shall not lift up sword against nation,

All: neither shall they learn war any more.

Leader: They shall all sit under their own vines and fruit trees;

All: and no one shall make them afraid. Amen

Introduction:

- 1. If the war goes on, and the young ones die of hunger, and the old men weep, for their children are no more, and farms lie idle, sad, abandoned and polluted, who will end this war?
- 2. If the war goes on, and the truth is taken hostage, and new terrors lead, to the need to euphemise, when the calls for peace, are declared unpatriotic, who'll expose the lies?
- 3. If the war goes on, and the daily bread is terror, and the voiceless poor, take the road as refugees; when a nation's pride, destines millions to be homeless, who will heed their pleas?
- 4. If the war goes on, and the rich increase their fortunes, and the arms sales soar, as new weapons are displayed; when a fertile field, turns to no-man's land tomorrow, who'll approve such trade?
- 5. If the war goes on, will we close the door to heaven?
 If the war goes on, will we breach the gates of hell?
 If the war goes on, will we ever be forgiven?

Prayers:

Leader: We gather at this solemn time, loving God, aware of the costliness of human history.

In the face of hostility between nations and neighbours, you have come to us in Jesus Christ,

offering us the gift of peace, calling us to serve as peacemakers.

In this time of worship, renew in us the hope that you will turn our swords into ploughshares, and by the power of the Holy Spirit, lead the world you love, away from the study of war to the promise of peace with justice for all your peoples.

Old enemies stir up conflict within their tribes and nations.

The threat of violence keeps us all on edge.

Forgive us for not learning from past conflicts,

forgive us when we harbour a desire to settle our own old scores, and keep conflict alive.

Leader: (based on Micah 6:8)

The prophet Micah declared that God requires of us three things:

to do justice, to love kindness, and to walk humbly with our God.

To all who turn away from hostility and seek reconciliation with

God and neighbour in kindness and humility, God offers forgiveness and peace.

All: The peace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with us all.

Prayers: (Strike the hammer.)

Reader A: We remember and lament the lies told to justify war and fuel hatred of 'enemies'. We know

with regret that 'in war, truth is the first casualty'.

All: God, have mercy.

Reader B: (A candle is lit.) Christ, be with those who work with compassion and integrity in warzones,

facing danger and witnessing daily horrors, whether soldiers or citizens, political negotiators,

health workers, reporters or peacemakers.

(Pause. Strike the hammer.)

Reader A: We remember and lament the arrogance that has driven the desire to settle old scores, to

acquire more land, resources and power, igniting battles to claim them.

All: God, have mercy.

Reader B: (A candle is lit.) Lord, may we learn to forgive ourselves and others, and to let others forgive

us. Help us to be honest about our own motives, to be counter-cultural and promote your

kingdom values.

(Pause. Strike the hammer.)

Reader A: We remember and lament the profiteering on weaponry and the diabolical schemes which

created poisons and plans to annihilate others.

All: God, have mercy.

Reader B: (A candle is lit.) Christ, encourage and protect those who raise awareness about the UK's involvement in arms sales and campaign against the arms industry.

(Pause. Strike the hammer.)

Reader A: We remember and lament the costs of wartime spending, diverting essential economic and human resources from tending to the common good and the needs of the most vulnerable.

All: God, have mercy.

Reader B: (A candle is lit.) Lord, open the eyes of our leaders to the true cost of warfare, that the most vulnerable pay that cost, and all suffer in the end.

(Pause. Strike the hammer.)

Reader A: We remember and lament the war crimes which exert cruelty on opponents and break international agreements on the conduct of combat and the defence of human rights. We grieve the damage to animals, land, sea and air, all innocent bystanders in human conflict.

All: God, have mercy.

Reader B: (A candle is lit.) Christ, shine your light so that all will know that their deeds will be visible to you and to the world. May perpetrators and victims be able to tell their stories making healing and reconciliation possible.

(Pause. Strike the hammer.)

Reader A: We remember and lament the vested interests and manipulation that goes on when war is planned or peace treaties negotiated, where the agendas of the strongest are more influential than the interests of justice and peace for all God's creation.

All: God, have mercy.

Reader B: (A candle is lit.) Lord, bless all those involved in communication, negotiations and peace making, the healing of broken lives, communities and infrastructure. May they work motivated by kingdom values, not self interest.

(Pause. Strike the hammer.)

Reader A: We remember and lament with all those who are injured, grieving and traumatised. We pray for those whose deep wounds from previous conflicts and ongoing oppression, have erupted with hatred and ignited renewed conflict.

All: God, have mercy.

Reader B: (A candle is lit.) Christ, shine your healing light on all those affected by war and conflict. Be with those who have campaigned for the resolution of conflict in Palestine and Israel, and are now broken hearted, feeling they have failed. May they continue to walk in your light, trusting that goodness could prevail.

(Two minutes silence)

Reader C: (John 1: 1–5) In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ² He was with God in the beginning. ³ Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. ⁴ In him was life, and that life was the light of all people. ⁵ The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

(Light the Christ Candle.)

For the word of God in scripture, for the word of God among us, for the word of God within us,

All: Thanks be to God.
