Bible Reading: John 4 v1-15: Jesus talks with a Samaritan woman

Reader: Now Jesus learned that the Pharisees had heard that he was gaining and baptising more disciples than John $-^{2}$ although in fact it was not Jesus who baptised, but his disciples. ³ So he left Judea and went back once more to Galilee.

⁴Now he had to go through Samaria. ⁵So he came to a town in Samaria called Sychar, near the plot of ground Jacob had given to his son Joseph. ⁶Jacob's well was there, and Jesus, tired as he was from the journey, sat down by the well. It was about noon.

⁷ When a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her, 'Will you give me a drink?' ⁸ (His disciples had gone into the town to buy food.)

⁹ The Samaritan woman said to him, 'You are a Jew and I am a Samaritan woman. How can you ask me for a drink?' (For Jews do not associate with Samaritans.)

¹⁰ Jesus answered her, 'If you knew the gift of God and who it is that asks you for a drink, you would have asked him and he would have given you living water.'

¹¹ 'Sir,' the woman said, 'you have nothing to draw with and the well is deep. Where can you get this living water? ¹² Are you greater than our father Jacob, who gave us the well and drank from it himself, as did also his sons and his livestock?'

¹³ Jesus answered, 'Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, ¹⁴ but whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life.'

¹⁵ The woman said to him, 'Sir, give me this water so that I won't get thirsty and have to keep coming here to draw water.'

Reader: For the word of God in scripture, for the word of God among us, for the word of God within us, **All:** Thanks be to God.

<u>Reflection:</u> (based on Matthew 10:42 'A cup of cold water from 'Summer' edited by Ruth Burgess)

A cup of cold water. Would you really call this a welcoming thing to offer? Good hospitality? Just plain cold water from the tap? Not very impressive. Not to me or you anyway. Just turn on the tap and here it is, without any effort. Just boring old water. Colourless, pretty tasteless, but on the plus side, it's clean and fresh, safe and reliable.

A cup of cold water to drink. It's the least you can do for someone. The very least. The bare minimum in fact. Even if you run out of tea and coffee and haven't so much as a digestive biscuit in the house, you can surely give a cup of water.

A cup of cold water. One in six people can only dream of this. A billion people across the world would give anything to be able to turn on a tap and pour out a cup of cold water. Every year, millions of people, millions of ordinary people just like us, die from preventable diseases linked directly to the lack of safe water.

A cup of cold water. It can mean so little. It can mean so much. Either way, thirst-quenching matters. It's kingdom work.
